The word epiphany means 'dawning' or 'revealing'. It has given rise to the saying: 'an epiphany moment' - this being when something wonderful or amazing suddenly dawns on us, and we see things more clearly. During this time we look at stories in the Bible where Jesus was revealed to the world both as a human and as God. The Season of Epiphany comes to a conclusion forty days after Christmas - when we celebrate the presentation of the infant Jesus in the Temple in Jerusalem.

Like many new parents, Mary and Joseph wanted to say thank you for the safe delivery and gift of their baby son Jesus. In their time and culture, there were certain ceremonies that needed to be carried out, and so they took the baby Jesus to the Temple, to present him to God. And they took a gift of two birds, to offer to God, to say thank you for this miraculous baby.

#### Countess Anne School Kindness Poem from the Head Boy and Head Girl

Foreword by James Emanuel, Assistant Headteacher Countess Anne Primary School



At Countess Anne School, the children elect a School Council committee each year which is called The Make Believers. The name is inspired by the Games Makers who helped organise the London 2012 Olympics.

The Make Believers is child-led and has the aim of improving the school for the children. They respond to suggestions from the children and the wider community and help to have an impact on all through positive acts. Some of their duties include leading assemblies, visiting residential homes for the elderly, leading play at lunch times, running lunchtime clubs and serving as positive role models for the school.

There are 10 Make Believers which is formed from children from Years 2-6. In addition to the Make Believers, the school elects a Head Boy and Head Girl (selected from Year 6 pupils) who join the Make Believers meetings. The

Head Boy and Head Girl put themselves forward and prepare a presentation to do in assembly and are chosen through a democratic process where all the staff have a vote as well as the children.

The Head Boy and Head Girl take a lead role in representing the school's values amongst the children. The values are honesty, kindness, perseverance, responsibility, respect and forgiveness. A different value is focused on each half term, although all values are celebrated and referred to throughout the year.

Last half term the school focused on Kindness. The Head Boy and Head Girl wrote a poem together on what kindness means to them.

## What does Kindness mean?

Kindness means to us that you are trust-worthy to your friends so that your friendship never ends.

Kindness means doing good for others as if they were your brothers and sisters.

Kindness means respecting difference, giving your time and asking 'Are you fine?'

Kindness means being understanding even when you're tired, so we don't hear anyone shout 'You're fired!'

Kindness means being supportive to your peers, when helping someone face their fears.

## The Salisbury Chapel Church Warden Richard Morton

One of the most fascinating and beautiful parts of St Eth's, the Salisbury Chapel is the private property of Lord Salisbury and his family, and they have recently had it restored to its former glory. You should certainly go and have a look.

Built in 1617 to commemorate Robert Cecil, chief minister to Elizabeth I and James I, the chapel contains his magnificent tomb by Maximillian Colt, the finest sculptor of the time, which is one of the greatest treasures of our church. In 1875 the third Marguess, later to be Prime Minister, commissioned Italian artist Giulio Taldini to transform the chapel with marble arcades and floors, dazzling frescoes on the walls and a beautifully painted ceiling - a fitting home for the tomb of his illustrious ancestor.

During the century that followed, Victorian gothic of this sort became deeply unfashionable and problems with the copper roof led to damage inside the chapel. Now though, thanks to painstaking work by specialist conservationists, Britain and Co, we can appreciate once again the full splendour of the design.

You can see, on the back page, some pictures of the work in progress and of details before and after restoration.

While you are visiting the chapel, have a look too at the large stone columns which divide it from the chancel. Two of the three columns date from 1617 making them, as far as I can ascertain the first full size classical columns used in England since the departure of the Romans. Such columns can only be made in one piece using the right type of stone and these are said to come from Shap in Cumbria. You can imagine how difficult it would have been to transport them 300 miles and to carve the delicate, precise curves involved.

Who then might have been responsible for such a groundbreaking piece of design? This type of column is known as Tuscan Doric and is shown in Palladio's text book of 1570. Inigo Jones, who owned and annotated a copy of the book, is known to have worked in Hatfield from about 1610 onwards and used identical columns for the famous portico of St Paul's Covent Garden a few years later. Could it be that he was responsible for these important but often overlooked columns?

# HATFIELD & CRANBORNE ESTATE NEWSLETTER

### November 2018

A new addition to our magazine is Estate News. It is often hard to imagine that we live side to side with a large working estate run for the Salisbury family by Gascoyne Cecil Estates. The Estate have kindly agreed to allow us to use extracts from the **HATFIELD & CRANBORNE ESTATE NEWSLETTER**, for the readers of Refocused to have a better understanding of what is entailed in the day-to-day workings of running such a large estate.

### **Estate News—Gardens**

I think it is safe to say that the summer of 2018 has left the gardens and its wonderful team of staff, volunteers and robots rather parched. During the dry spells we delayed planting and turned our attention to supporting the already establishing plants in the garden to ensure they were not left wanting for moisture. I must thank my team for all their hard work during the sweltering conditions to keep plants as well as themselves hydrated.

Earlier this year saw the first of two Robotic AutoMowers manufactured by Husqvarna installed on the North Front. We have seen marked improvement in the quality of the sward, and its ability to recover following the dry, hot weather has been better than elsewhere in the gardens. Their ability to mow day or night or when it is raining has meant that we have consistently had neatly mown lawns. Following the success of these two machines, we will be introducing further AutoMowers to the garden where appropriate.

At the top of the Woodland Garden we have repurposed a pair of oak doors which were once in the restaurant and used them for the entrance of the Yew Tree House.

The dryness did help to reduce mowing frequency, however this has meant increased work this autumn to try and revive the lawns, which will continue into the spring.

We have undertaken target crown reduction on many of the large trees in the Woodland Garden to help reduce the chance of limb failure. This work is normally carried out by tree surgeons climbing the trees which is a slow and difficult process. On this occasion, we utilised a 48 metre lorry mounted work platform to reach the canopies.

Behind the scenes in the Gardeners' Yard, we have concreted the base of our three compost bays and improved the access to our yard from the North Avenue by changing the angle of the gates to allow for deliveries.

In the East Parterre our major project this year has been to remove the low ailing box hedging planting which surrounds the perimeter of each bed. This has involved the removal of the box plants, resetting of the brick bed edge and recent planting of 2,630 *ilex crenata Dark Green* which we are using in this area as a box substitute. This forms part of a wider review of our use of box across the garden with the current pressure facing it with both pest and disease problems.
